

PCJ: Tailoring premises, procedures (laws?), services, relationships and activities to needs of justice seekers and their communities



Tailoring premises, procedures, activities to justice seekers and communities: therapeutic courtroom



Improving the experience of the community at every justice system 'touchpoint', <u>not just courts</u>



Mainstreaming PCJ Strategies at Georgia ROLP

- 1. Promoting **better cross-institutional engagement** within the justice sector
- 2. Building capacity to measure and meet community needs and attitudes
- 3. Embedding **'PCJ thinking'** within traditional justice institutions (courts, universities, legal profession)
- 4. Promoting innovative ways of educating, and engaging with, the community about justice and legal issues

I. Promoting better cross-institutional understanding and engagement



- Promoted judges' and mediators' work to expand court-annexed mediation
- Supported Ombudsman's office and NGOs to pursue strategic litigation
- Result: 45 important legal precedents in areas of
 - domestic violence,
 - children's rights,
 - employment rights,
 - freedom of expression etc.

Cross-institutional engagement in justice sector




- Annual Court Management Seminars
- <u>Bringing together court</u> staff, researchers, judges, lawyers, policy think-tanks, international experts
 - Court governance
 - Measuring workloads
 - PCJ
 - Quality of justice
 - Jury management

Universities and courts



- Established legal clinics at Georgian universities that work with courts
- One clinic trained students to monitor domestic violence cases
- Another clinic studied the difference between judicial impartiality perceived by litigants vs neutral observers
- Procedural justice was seen as most important to litigants
- Judges' active listening skills
- Judge's 'reputation'
- allowed the parties to express themselves
- ensured clear comprehension, plain language

2. Equipping justice institutions to measure and meet a range of community needs (not just dispensing justice)







Domestic Violence Quiz: Help a friend

- We funded the creation of a quiz to assist people whose personal information has been exposed, leading to threat of domestic violence.
- Informational blackmail, threats by partner, etc
- More than 25,000 people have filled out the quiz to date

Quiz: Can you help a friend?



Violence against women in various forms remains an unsolved problem to this day. A number of women have been victims of blackmail and threats by a partner, ex-partner or other people.

People-centered approach <u>builds trust</u>

- Every user interaction with justice system either enhances or erodes trust.
- PCJ approach enhances trust between justice institutions and its communities
- Conversely, lack of trust reduces their confidence in the legal system and its outcomes
